MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

The past year's accomplishments, as outlined in this annual report, are the result of a sustained collective effort. Our team of employees, our director, and partners worked together in order for us to achieve our strategic orientations and to position ourselves to become the key actor for Francophones in Northern Ontario in the health care system transformation. The Réseau also supported the Francophone community and the efforts of its various partners following the changes announced by the government last November to ensure that the needs of Francophones are met and to emphasize the importance of French language services.

We took advantage of our Board meetings being held in various regions across our territory to meet with our partners and share this message. This was also an opportunity for the members of the Board of Directors to become more familiar with the challenges of the different regions.

I was also the Réseau's representative and acted as Vice-Chair on the Board of Directors of Société Santé en français (SSF). The SSF works in close collaboration with the French health networks in each province and territory, to ensure better access to French language health care programs and services. Our presence serves to underline the importance of la Francophonie at every level of government.

Our projects and work in the field help pave the way to ensure equitable access to health care services in French throughout our territory. It is important to note the leadership shown by our Executive Director and her team in the positioning of the Réseau.

I would like to thank the members of the Board of Directors for their involvement and open-mindedness and for allowing the

Réseau to continue to be a key actor with respect to French language health care services in

Northern Ontario.

I am pleased to present our 2018-2019 annual report. This report is our method of informing and highlighting for the Francophone population and our funders, the many accomplishments of our team members who, day after day, contribute to the improvement and equity of French language health care services.

Our work at the provincial level and in the field is well-known and respected. This enables-us to influence the system in order to promote the importance of French language health services in the transformation of the health care system.

Last year was marked by the announcement of major changes in the health care system with the passing of Bill 74, The People's Health Care Act, 2019. We are delighted to see that the new agency created under the law, Ontario Health, has an obligation to establish mechanisms for collaboration with the Francophone Health Planning Entities in the matters of engagement and French language service planning. Prior to the enactment of the Act, the Regroupement des Entités de planification sought to influence the proposed legislation by submitting a brief and appearing before the Standing Committee on Social Policy. The recommendations for improvements to Bill 74 related to French language health services shared by the Planning Entities and several other partners and key Francophone stakeholders had a positive impact in bringing about some of the desired changes in the Act. At the local level, the Act provides for the creation of Ontario Health Teams (OHT). The Réseau was involved in the process of preparing self-assessment submissions for each group of service providers wishing to become an OHT in the North, thus ensuring that French language health services were included in the planning of these teams. The Réseau worked relentlessly with the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care, health service providers, and its partners, to ensure that Francophones were taken into account in the transformation of the system and the health care planning.

The annual report provides an overview of the magnitude of the work we accomplished this year with respect to active offer. Our interactive on-line training on active offer was a resounding success with 244 persons completing the training, 210 of whom were from Northern Ontario. As well, several providers in our territory implemented policies on active offer.

In conclusion, I am proud to announce our designation under the *French Language Services Act*, a long-awaited announcement for the Réseau's team who worked many hours to prepare the submission to the Ministry.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank and congratulate the Réseau's entire team for the quality of the work they performed. Thank you to the Board of Directors who, by their leadership and governance, were able to guide the Réseau during this past year in achieving its planned results. Finally, I wish to thank all our partners who supported us in our work.







Targeted projects to improve French language health care service planning

LONG-TERM CARE PROJECT

- * Creation of a best practice database to be shared with Long-Term Care.
- * Mapping to align bilingual human resources with Frenchspeaking residents.
- *6 homes have been targeted for identification and 5 for designation.
- * Implementation of recommendations outlined in the 2017 reports is ongoing in the NE and NW.

PROJECT TO IDENTIFY PATIENT EXPERIENCE

- * 6 HSPs were targeted to take part In this project.
- *A survey to capture patient experience was developed and validated by 4 communities (Smooth Rock Falls, Mattice-Val Côté, Sudbury and Ignace), 28 Carrefour santé members, the Réseau and the NE-LHIN
- * 14 patients/family caregivers took part in sessions held in Thunder Bay and Cochrane.






ACTIVE OFFER PROJECT




The training was presented at the International "Muster" conference in Australia.

The Réseau supports HSPs in terms of community engagement and FLS committees, and the


Planning Officers also meet with HSPs to improve French language services by means of concrete measures such as development of policies, implementation of active offer, and presentations to staff and management.



The Réseau has continued to support HSPs in their work to meet French language services requirements. This work is assessed by means of the FLS reports in the OZi web portal. The collected data leads to better French language health service planning, such as identifying gaps and opportunities in utilizing bilingual human resources more efficiently. In addition to supporting health

service providers with best practices for t h e implementation of French language health services, the Réseau's Planning Officers, in collaboration with the LHIN, have continued their evaluation of designated health service providers. These providers are evaluated every three years and must account for their French language services in accordance with the criteria set out in their designation plan.



The Réseau and the NE LHIN presented Minto Counselling Centre a certificate of compliance of their FLS designation under the *French Language Services Act*.
