# Message from the Chair

10 ans Years tisse serve Tightly Knit

This year we are celebrating the 10th anniversary of the *Réseau du mieux-* être francophone du Nord de l'Ontario (Réseau). The Réseau was established thanks to the overall vision of two Northern Ontario Francophone health networks. In fact, we have been present in Northern Ontario since 2003 and have established solid partnerships to achieve a number of initiatives with lasting results.

Allow me to take a step back to recognize the enormous contribution made by the former *Réseau francophone de santé du Nord de l'Ontario* and *Réseau de santé en français du Moyen-Nord de l'Ontario*. The two Francophone health networks who shared a common vision, seized the opportunity to

merge into one organization to respond to the changes in the health care system. As such, in 2010, the newly formed *Réseau* was named the French Language Health Planning Entity for Northern Ontario.

Over the years we have learned to adapt to changes in our environment in order to ensure continued collaboration with the communities and to influence the health care system on how to improve the health of Francophones living in minority settings across Northern Ontario.

We are now in 2020, and once again, the health care system is in full transformation. As part of our engagement with the community, along with our partners and government officials, we have demonstrated, on a number of occasions, the importance of working together to ensure better planning for health services so that Francophones can live and be healthy, in French. We will remain vigilant and take the necessary measures to ensure the well-being of Francophones.

Thank you to all who have contributed to making the *Réseau* what it is today: the two founding *Réseaux*, corporate and individual members, members of the Board of Directors, the Executive Director and her team, and our partners: the Société Santé en français, the Ministry of Health, the Ministry of Long-Term Care, as well as the North East LHIN and the North West LHIN.

# Message from the Executive Director

The past year was very eventful for the *Réseau du mieux-être francophone du Nord de l'Ontario (Réseau*). We were called upon to intervene on a number of fronts - the transformation of the health care system, projects with our partners, the designation and identification of health service providers and, let's not forget, the adaptation of our active offer training modules at the national level. In addition, the *Réseau* obtained its own designation pursuant to the French Language Services Act.

Over the course of the past year, the Réseau has been very involved with the *Regroupement des Entités de planification des services de santé en français de l'Ontario*, to ensure inclusion of Francophones in the system transformation, more specifically as it relates to the People's Health Care Act, 2019 and the development of the Regulation governing the work of the Entities. We also collaborated with the other *Entités* to organize consultations with the Premier's Council on Improving Healthcare and Ending Hallway Medicine.

The *Réseau* continued its collaboration efforts by supporting partners working to transform the health care system. We worked closely with fifteen groups in our region who sought to become an Ontario Health Team. We developed a number of resources describing how to incorporate the Francophone perspective throughout the application process to ensure that Francophones have equitable access to health care services. These resources were very much appreciated by all partners. Our collaborative work continues with all of the Northern Ontario Health Teams and those working towards becoming one.

We remained engaged in our work of supporting health service providers to ensure that all the designation requirements are maintained. As a result, 16 of the 42 designated providers in the North East are now in compliance with the 34 designation criteria pursuant to the French Language Services Act. Additionally, another 4 organizations in the North East are currently working on their request for designation. As for the North West, 10 new providers have been identified to offer French language services and work towards their designation and one has initiated the work, as part of a pilot project, to obtain a partial designation.

The interactive online active offer training continues to be very popular with the number of individuals having completed the training growing rapidly. We now have over 1,000 people that have completed the training. To make the training more accessible, we have adapted the material making it relevant for all provinces and territories. We are equally thrilled that this training has now been integrated within Laurentian University's Francophone Undergraduate Nursing Program as well as being part of the staff orientation guide for both the NE LHIN and the NW LHIN.

The *Réseau's* team continues to adapt and evolve with the new reality of the health care system. Our projects and work with our partners continue to move forward in line with our priorities. I would like to thank our Board of Directors for their confidence and support in our work. Thank you to my team who have been able to adapt to the changes of the past year with confidence and resilience.



# **Planning**

#### System Transformation and the Francophone Lens

The implementation of the <u>People's Health Care Act, 2019</u> was the leading factor of the health care system transformation. The <u>Réseau</u> was active at all levels to ensure that the needs of Francophones were included throughout the transformation process. At the provincial level, the <u>Réseau</u> contributed by means of the <u>Regroupement des Entités de planification des services de santé en français (Regroupement des Entités)</u> in order to provide a common voice for Francophones from across the province. At regional and local levels, our work involved supporting groups who aspired to become Ontario Health Teams.



The *Réseau* was at Queen's Park for a meeting with the Minister Responsible for Mental Health and Addictions, Members of Parliament, the *Assemblée de la francophonie de l'Ontario (AFO)* and the other French Language Health Planning Entities. It was also an opportunity to highlight Francophonie Week and the filing of a Bill to make the Franco-Ontarian flag an official flag of Ontario.


#### Planning the Ontario Health Teams


The *Réseau* was actively involved in many planning activities that took place across the region. The *Réseau* continued to promote, by means of presentations, the inclusion of the Francophone lens with provincial, regional and local sectorial committees of the health care system. Part of this work involved working with groups applying to become an Ontario Health Team (OHT), a process stemming from the health care system transformation. The *Réseau* prepared a series of supporting documents to encourage full integration of French language services. These documents and the *Réseau*'s support were very much appreciated by the partners as noted by Dominic Giroux, CEO of Health Sciences North.

#### Projects That Reach Various Age Groups

Planning also targeted specific projects for which the Réseau is funded. This year, these projects included a wide range of age groups from early childhood to long-term care homes.



#### **Project - Access to French Language Services** in Long-Term Care Homes



Implementation of recommendations stemming from a study conducted by the Réseau. Actions include, among others, the identification of homes for the offer of French language services; homes requiring support for the offer of French language services and; development of strategies to implement culturally appropriate care. The Réseau is also working on developing a process for cultural designation.


#### A New Platform and Rapid Growth

This year, we launched a new userfriendly platform of the online Active Offer of French Language Services training which allows for group registration. There was a 400% increase in the number of certificates issued for the interactive online active offer training. This increase is partly due to the fact that both the North East and North West LHINs (Ontario North) have included this training as a mandatory component for both planning and community support staff.

#### **Continuing Education Credits**

In addition to having accreditation from the Canadian College of Health Leaders, the training is now accredited by the College of Family Physicians of Canada and the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada.

The Réseau and their colleagues from the Entité2 presented a webinar on the training to the Hamilton Niagara Haldimand Brant Community of Practice committee from the area.



# Accountability

#### On the Road to Compliance and Implementation

Holding health service provider partners accountable leads to improving accessible and equitable French language health services. The *Réseau* provides support to all designated, identified and non-identified providers in completing the French language services reports in the OZi Web Portal. Analysis of this data provides us with a better understanding of the health service provider needs for the purpose of planning and implementing French language services for designation compliance. A range of tools and resources developed by the *Réseau* and their partners are shared to best support health service providers in accordance with their designation status and their needs.







#### **Identified Providers**

The identified providers are called upon to plan and implement services in French with a view to eventually follow through on a request for designation pursuant to the French Language Services Act. The Réseau is supporting five health service providers with their designation request. One provider is part of a pilot project led by the Ministry of Francophone Affairs, which aims to streamline the designation process. In addition, the Réseau developed an implementation indicator used to measure progress made by identified providers.

# Accountability (cont'd)



#### **Designated Providers**

This year, we initiated the 2<sup>nd</sup> triennial evaluation cycle of designations. Further to this evaluation and the resulting recommendations, the *Réseau* supports designated health service providers in being compliant with the designation criteria. By means of the compliancy indicator, we were able to measure the progress made by the health service providers in the past year. Nine organizations were fully compliant with the 34 designation criteria pursuant to the *French Language Services Act*. These health service providers are guaranteeing access to quality French language health services and are committed to providing French language services on a permanent basis. The *Réseau* and the North East LHIN presented compliance certificates to:

# Partners Committed to Providing French Language Health Services

The Réseau has gained the respect of the Francophone community and health care system by engaging and working with partners over time. With respect to educational institutions, the Réseau is often called upon to provide presentations to students. In addition, the Réseau has established a solid partnership with the Northern Ontario School of Medicine (NOSM). At the community level, the Réseau is a member of a number of collaborative intersectoral tables, community organizations and community action tables of the Assemblée de la francophonie de l'Ontario (AFO). The Réseau also continues its work with local Carrefours santé (Health hubs) and Tables santé (Health sector tables) in a number of communities. This allows the *Réseau* to engage with a variety of partners for the purpose of improving French language health services. Furthermore, in order to maintain close ties with northern communities, the Réseau's Board of Directors holds in-person meetings in various locations, along with meet-and-greets with community partners. This year, the board held meetings in North Bay and Timmins.


