

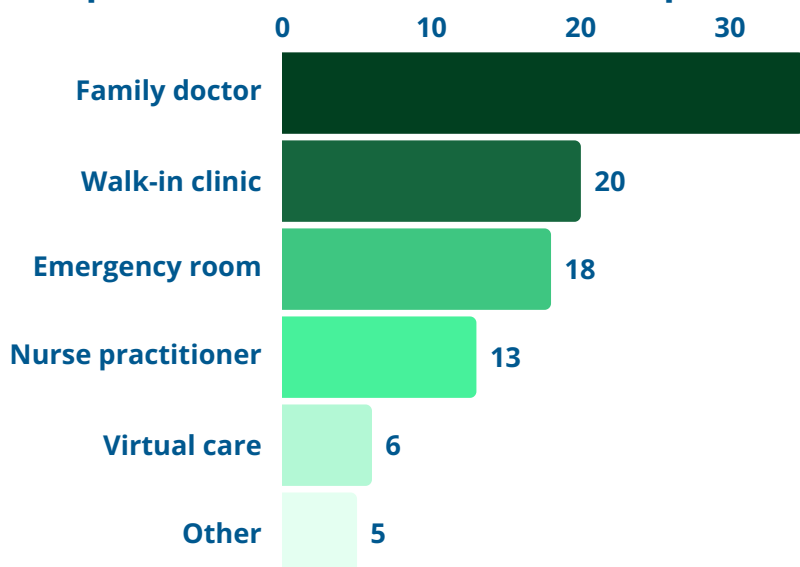
# The Question of the Month of February - Results

How do you access primary care services for yourself and your family members?

February's question focused on how Francophones in the North access primary care for themselves and their families.

The limited sample of respondents (51) does not allow us to draw clear conclusions. Nevertheless, we can share the following results.

The majority of respondents (48) said they have access to a family doctor or nurse practitioner. In addition, 49 respondents said that they use walk-in



clinics, virtual services, emergency rooms or other means to access primary care. We can see that, although respondents have access to a family doctor or nurse practitioner, the use of clinics, virtual care and the emergency room is high. This leads us to believe that timely access to primary care remains a

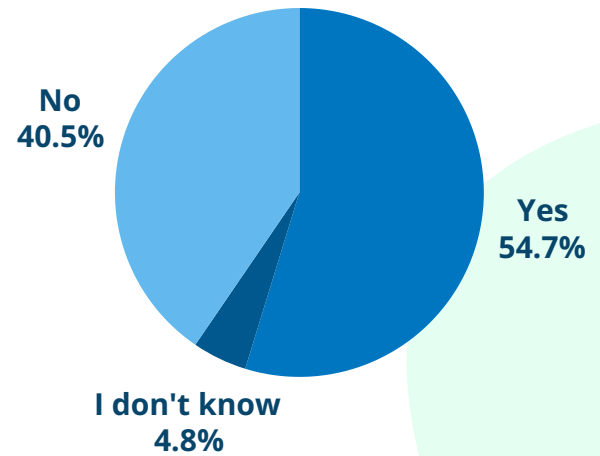
concern, whether or not you have a family doctor or nurse practitioner.



# The Question of the Month of February - Results

54.7 % of respondents say they have access to services in French, and 45.3 % say they don't have access to services in French or don't know if services are available in French. It's important to note that access to French-language services can vary across the North and is dependent on access to a Francophone Community Health Centre.
